Trust Services sanctions

09 June 2023

HM Treasury brought the provision of trust services into its financial sanctions regime in December last year.

A number of questions have been raised about this approach since then. So the Office of Financial Sanctions Implementation (OFSI), which is responsible for enforcement of the sanctions regime, https://ofsi.blog.gov.uk/2023/05/30/trust-services-sanctions-5-months-on/] to address such issues.

Examples include clarity on the term '*Persons Connected with Russia*'. OGSI have confirmed this does not include Russian nationals who are not ordinarily resident or located in Russia. The 'domicile' test only applies to a person who is not an individual (eg a company).

The **General Licence**

[https://assets.publishing.service.gov.uk/government/uploads/system/uploads/attachment_data/file/1144418/Trust_Services_General_Licence_2023-2589788.pdf] applies to persons designated under the trust services sanctions, it does not apply to trust services provided to or for the benefit of persons connected with Russia.

It includes a <u>reporting obligation [https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/sanctions-trust-services]</u> to let OFSI know that you are winding down provision of a trust service.

The licence took effect from 22 May 2023 and expires on 21 November 2023.
